

## PPA MISSION STATEMENT

*“To prepare Leaders/Police Officials for the Punjab police and other states who will lead/command the force with courage, uprightness, dedication and a strong sense of service to the people, with an eye on higher education, technological advancement and human rights.”*

## **The Institution**

*The institution was established as Police Training School in the historic Maharaja Ranjit Singh Fort at Phillaur on 9 September, 1891 with Mr. J.M. Bishop, IP, Assistant District Superintendent of Police as its first Principal. It was raised to the status of a College in the year 1967. It was re-christened as Maharaja Ranjit Singh Punjab Police Academy in 1995. The Academy imparts training to IPS (Prob.), IAS (Prob.), PCS (Executive & Judicial), Deputy Supdt. of Police and Sub Inspectors, besides organizing regular Pre-Promotion Courses, long term and short term specialized training courses. The detailed information regarding these courses is available in this booklet.*

## **The Fort**

*The Punjab Police Academy is housed in the Maharaja Ranjit Singh Fort. The town of Phillaur in which this fort is located owes its origin to a Sanghera Jat, Phul, who called the town after himself, 'Phulnagar'. Subsequently the Naru Rajputs, under Rai Shahr, whose territory extended from Mau to Selkiana, occupied it and when his son, Rai Ratten Pal abandoned Mau and settled at Phillaur, the Jats left. The modern town dates back to the time of Shah Jahan (1627-1658 A.D.) when the site, then covered with ruins, was reoccupied, having been selected for the erection of a serai on the road from Delhi to Lahore.*

*On the rise of Sikhs to power, the place was seized by one Sudh Singh Kaharah who made it the capital of his state. The family became extinct in 1807, and the place then fell into the hands of Maharaja Ranjit Singh, who recognized its importance as a frontier town commanding the most frequented ferry of the river Sutlej. Under his governor, Mohkam Chand, a strong force was stationed at Phillaur, and between 1809 and 1812 the serai was converted into a fort, as a counter-measure to British occupation of Ludhiana fort. The architect is said to have been an Italian engineer. When the Sikh garrison under S. Ranjodh Singh Majithia was withdrawn after the battle of Aliwal (January 28, 1846). Chaudhari Kutb-ud-din of Phillaur secured the keys of the Fort, preserved them from plunder, and handed them over to Colonel Macheson and Brigadier Wheeler when the British troops entered the Doab.*

*In the same year after the battle of Aliwal, a British cantonment was formed in the neighborhood of the Fort, which continued to be occupied by native troops until 1857, when the detachment stationed there rebelled. The Fort itself became an important artillery arsenal and magazine. In 1863 the artillery and magazine were withdrawn from the Fort. A detachment of native infantry was left as garrison. In 1891, even this detachment was withdrawn and the Fort was handed over to the Police Department.*

## **The Mazar**

*The Fort also enshrines the mausoleum of a religious saint, fondly remembered as Pir Baba Abdullah Shah.*

## **Police Museum**

*The idea of starting a Crime Museum in the Training School building was first conceived by Mr. G.A.Rundle, Principal, in the year 1900 and necessary sanction for setting it up was accorded by the Govt. in 1901. The museum thus came into existence in 1901 and has continued to grow. The museum contains articles of interest like tools, implements used in crime, forged coins and currency notes, dyes, old Police records, old and rare weapons of offence etc. Museum hosts many antique weapons and a photo gallery of old and rare photographs.*

## **Cyber Forensic Training Lab**

*The CFTL was established in March 2017 with the help of experts from the Centre for Development of Advance Computing (C-DAC), Thiruvananthapuram. The lab is equipped with latest software and equipment to track and retrieve digital data. Training is being imparted in 4 modules of cyber forensics i.e. disk forensics, device forensics, live forensics and network forensics.*

## **Traffic Training Centre**

*A Traffic Training Centre along with a Miniature Traffic Training Park set up in the Academy is used for imparting training related to traffic regulation and awareness.*

## **Information Technology Cell**

*A well-equipped Information Technology Cell has been set up to impart computer related training to the trainees. The main focus of the IT cell is to make police officials adept at the use of computers and police related computer applications.*

## **Higher Police Education Programmes**

*The Academy is affiliated to the Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar. The trainees can avail the facility to undergo M.A. and Ph.D. programmes in the discipline of Police Administration. HoD (Social Sciences) can be contacted on 01826-222061 Ext. No 112 for details.*

## **Fire Arms Training System (FATS)**

*The Academy has the distinction of possessing a sophisticated Fire Arms Training Simulator. FATS is a latest electronic weapon training simulator based on judgmental shooting. Various types of situations are projected on the screen on which five trainees can react at a time to a situational scenario. It is an ideal system for sharpening reflexes in real life situations coupled with accurate evaluation of performance of the trainees.*

## **Tear Smoke Training at PPA**

*The concept of Tear Smoke first arrived in India at PTS Phillaur in 1933 during the tenure of Mr. F.H. De Heaume. After various experiments and demonstrations, Tear Smoke Squad was established in 1937. From 1940 onwards regular training for various organizations of the country was carried out at PTC. Adopting the principle of use of minimum force, other techniques were developed and the course has been renamed as Public Order Management Course which has been regularly running at the Academy.*

## **Facilities Available at PPA**

### **Library**

*The Academy library holds more than 40,000 books and subscribes to more than 50 periodicals. It stocks, for the use of the trainees, books on policing, criminology, law, social science and literary subjects. The library provides an excellent facility to scholars undertaking research on policing and allied subjects.*

### **Conference Halls**

*The institution has two well-furnished and well-equipped conference halls which are used for organizing specialized training programmes, conferences and other academic symposia.*

### **Gazetted Officers' Mess**

*One of the most significant assets of the Punjab Police Academy is the GOs' Mess. It is a repository of a rich tradition and is an important institution for inculcating manners and etiquette in the trainee police officers. A Convention Hall has recently been added to the Officers' Mess.*

### **Modern Shooting Ranges**

*The Academy has its own mechanically operated long and short shooting ranges equipped with modern infrastructure necessary for latest weapon training and shooting practice.*

## **Hospital**

*The Academy has a well-established 15 bedded hospital, headed by a Senior Medical Officer. It is equipped with outdoor patient care units, physiotherapy unit and an X-ray machine.*

## **Post Office and ATM**

*A Post office and an ATM are available on the premises of the Academy.*

## **Swimming Pool**

*The Academy has a swimming pool and the trainees can avail the facilities of this pool. A new swimming pool of international size is also in the making, which will become functional shortly.*

## **Squash Court**

*An old squash court of 1937 vintage is also available within the fort.*

## **Auditorium**

*The Academy possesses a large modern auditorium with seating capacity of 1400, which is currently under renovation.*

## **Golf Course**

*Academy has an eighteen hole Golf Course with club facilities.*

## **CAPITATION FEE**

*Police and other govt. organisations from different states can avail training facilities of the Academy by nominating officers from different training course on payment of prescribed capitation fee. The respective organizations are required to provide necessary ammunition for training of its officers.*
